Teachers Join School of Bright Promise

STEUBENVILLE-Two teachers with a combined total of 34 years' experience in education have joined the Jefferson County School of Bright Promise to serve students with special needs.

Nannette Neary and Connie Parise became part of the staff this school year after years of serving in public and parochial schools.

Neary, a lifelong Steubenville resident, mostly taught primary school during her 24 years with the Diocese of Steubenville. She earned a degree in special education with a minor in elementary education through Franciscan University but spent many years working with typical classes. Over time, she opted to make a change.

"I guess through working with regular education, I wanted to work with special education. I looked on the School of Bright Promise's website and they were looking for an intervention specialist, so I applied," she said.

The spot was taken, but soon another window opened with the retirement of another teacher this summer. Now, Neary said she is right where she is meant to be.

"If I can make a difference on a daily basis for at least one of my students, then I feel like I've accomplished one of my goals."

Parise, who has been an educator for nearly a decade, served as head of intervention at Indian Creek Middle School and was an eighth-grade intervention teacher. The Steubenville resident earned a bachelor's degree in graphic design from West Liberty State College (presently known as West Liberty University) and took time to raise a family before obtaining her master's degree in special education from Franciscan University. She said she was inspired to work with the School of Bright Promise and its caring staff.

"I've heard a lot of things about the School of Bright Promise. They are very considerate to the needs of special needs students," Parise said. "It's a very loving place for kids to be."

While she has primarily worked with middle school pupils, Parise currently instructs six preschool through first-grade students. The transition has been a challenge, but it is one she is eager to rise and meet.

"I really love my eighth graders, but it's a transition going back to the beginning. It is the most demanding but rewarding job I've ever had. The staff has been helpful and I love working here."

Principal Rachel Bodo welcomed the newest addition to the faculty and said they bring experience and positivity to their roles.

"I'm glad they were chosen. They are doing a fantastic job and have learned quickly. I'm very excited to have them on the staff."

Bodo said a reduction in class sizes sparked the need for another teacher, leaving six classes with roughly six students each. That change allows each pupil to have more attention as they learn. She noted that Neary and Parise also worked during the summer and attended in-service training sessions with the Watson Institute of Sewickley, Pa., to prepare for class.
